

Student Spotlight

Runlai Eric Jiang joined the Wilmington Friends School

community this year and has already managed to become a superstar there. Whether it's his funny jokes in class, his friendly and outgoing attitude, or his competitiveness in sports, Eric makes things interesting. His experience so far in America has been stellar to say the least. He



was selected to be on the student panel to meet with the school's Board of Trustees during their visit earlier this month. In addition to playing lacrosse, Eric has wrestled for WFS. He says, "I like the WFS community. It's fun, teachers and students are all nice here. I like to the play sports with my teammates, and I like to learn with my classmates. Compared to the school community in China, Eric says, "Here I know people in different grades and ages, because there are many people in one grade in China." The differences between America and China are many. Eric seems to enjoy American culture, but when asked about what he misses about China, he replied, "In China, there are a lot of people, just like in New York City, and it is quieter here. In China, people always invite people to eat in restaurants, but here people go to each other's houses." There were many surprises in the US, too, for example, he was shocked when he saw students in class who got out of their seats without asking for permission. "When I saw people under 18 drive a car, I was surprised too." He is one of several foreign students at WFS who may choose to stay there through their senior year. While his first name is Runlai, people often refer to him as Eric. When asked which he preferred, he shared, "A foreign teacher gave me the name Eric when I was five years old. My dad gave me the Runlai only two years ago." Eric's host parents, Rebeca and Brian Fahey have hosted international students off and on for 20 years. Brian serves as Head of School at West Chester Friends School. Rebeca, who teaches Spanish at the University of Delaware, explains, "It's always an interesting experience to host people from different cultures. It's somewhat like traveling because it gets you to reflect on your own culture and customs. Hosting is a way to broaden horizons and have new experiences."
